



Panel holds back its report on crime Bills

he Parliamentary Standing Commit-tee on Home Af-fairs postponed its adop-tion of a draft report on three Bills seeking to re-place the existing criminal laws, after pressure from the Opposition parties seeking more time to exa-

According to sources, the English version of the draft report was circulated just last week and the Hindi version was sent to members of the Parliamen members of the Parliamen-tary panel only on Thurs-day evening, just hours be-fore the adoption of the report was slated at Fri-day's meeting of the panel. Three members - Congress MPs Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury and Digivijay Singh, along with Dravida Crime and punishment mittee, as per the draft report circulated so far



Munnetra Kazhagam MP N.R. Elango – have so far filed dissent notes, the sources said. They are demanding several changes in the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023 that will replace the Indian Penal Code, and the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita. 2023 that will replace the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC). More dissent notes

are expected to follow. One key point of conten-tion, the Hindi nomenclature of the Bills, has not been accepted in the draft reports. The panel's report states that since the text of the Bill is in English it does not violate provisions of Article 348 of Constitution.

Dark pattern sales by airlines, online agents deemed 'cybercrime'

Following complaints about practices by airlines and online travel agents that entail tricking consumers into making unintended purchases – such as paying for seats – while booking flight tickets, which one government official called a "cybercrime", the Ministry of Civil Aviation has asked low-cost carrier IndiGo to rectify its website.

The rap for the airline comes days before a meeting of the Consumer Affairs Ministry to discuss such complaints from air travellers to be held on November 9. Attendees will include representatives from the Ministry of Civil Aviation, airlines, online travel agents, and NGOs representing consumers. The agenda of the meeting is to discuss complaints about

airlines extending the charge on seat selection to all seats, incidents of passengers denied boarding despite a valid ticket, etc.

'Unfair practice'

Consumer Affairs Secretary Rohit Kumar Singh said, "A dark pattern is one where an entity nudges consumers to buy products they didn't intend to, which is an unfair trading practice, and can constitute a cybercrime."

He added that in the current online environment, there seemed to be a systemic practice of fooling consumers. The Ministry received nearly 10,000 such complaints through the National Consumers Helpline over the last eight to nine months.

A cursory analysis of airline websites, apps and online portals by *The Hindu* showed that such "dark patterns" were widely prevalent. Queries sent to IndiGo, SpiceJet and MakeMyTrip went unanswered till the time of going to press.

Manipulating seat selection

For instance, IndiGo's website deploys a technique known as "false urgency" to give consumers booking an air ticket the impression that they have to pay an extra fee of ₹99 to ₹1,500 to buy a seat to complete the purchase, as all free seats are shown as unavailable. Sometimes, there will be four or five free seats available but they are relegated to the bottom of the aircraft cabin and can be harder to locate and navigate to on the webpage. While passengers can hit the "skip" button at the end of the seat selection page, they are not informed in a transparent manner that free seats will be auto-assigned to them if they do not wish to pay the extra sum.

On IndiGo's mobile application, even the option to "skip" is placed in the top right corner and displayed in a tiny font. Such a practice is also known as "interface interference", where the website design highlights certain specific information and deliberately obscures other information.

Ministry of Civil Aviation sources said on Thursday: "This is a design of IndiGo website template and there is no malafide intent." They added that the airline has now been directed to provide a clear option for auto-assigned seats.

The searches were con-ducted at 17 places in New Delhi, Chandigarh, Panch-kula, Ambala and Mumbal. The ED probe is based

on a case registered by the CBI in December 2021, alleging that Parabolic Drugs and 11 others cheated a consortium of 12 banks to the tune of ₹1,626.74 crore.

Mizoram has highest cancer incidence rate in India, finds study

Despite being the country's second least populated State, Mizoram exhibits the highest cancer incidence rate in India.

The latest evidence from an 18-year trend study notes a consistent uptick in cancer incidence and mortality in the State, with stomach cancer emerging as the primary cause of cancer-related deaths among men, while lung cancer plays a parallel role among women.


Cancer incidence and mortality is also growing among the younger generation in Mizoram, which may stem from the static lifestyle and dietary patterns prevalent within the endogamous tribal population, potentially contributing to a genetic predisposition, according to the study, titled "Cancer



New Assam govt order: Employees can't enter second marriage without permission

SUKRITA BARUAH GUWAHATI, OCTOBER 27

THE ASSAM government, which is working on a law to ban polygamy in the state, has issued an order disallowing government employees from entering into a second marriage without the permission of the government.

The order states that noncompliance will invite department proceedings for the imposition of penalties that may include compulsory retirement. Apart from this, it states that steps will also be taken for legal penal action.

sued in a Personnel Department office memorandum on October 20. With a subject title 'Bigamous Marriages', the memorandum states that it is reiterating a rule of the Assam Civil Services (Conduct) Rules, 1965. It goes on to state that a government servant with a living wife who wants to enter into a second marriage must first obtain permission from

the government "notwithstanding that such subsequent marriage is permissible under the personal law for the time being applicable to him". It also states that no woman government servant may marry a person who has a living wife without similar permission.

Speaking about the order on Friday, Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said that this was a pre-existing rule which is now being enforced by the state government. "An Assam government employee from the point of view of our service rules is not entitled to enter into a second marriage. However, if some religion allows you to enter into a second

marriage, even then from the conduct rules, you have to seek permission from the state government. Now, the state government might give you or might not give you (the permission). We often get cases where after the death of an employee, both the wives fight for the person's pension. We find it very difficult to settle those disputes. Today, many wives are deprived of their pension because of conflicting claims," he said.

This move comes even as the Assam government has been saying that it is working to introduce a ban on the practice of polygamy in the state through "legislative action" in the next Assembly session. Sarma had first announced this in


May this year and had constituted an expert committee to examine the legality of such action. In August, the committee submitted a report which stated that the state legislature has the "legislative competence" to enact such a law.

"The courts have clarified that religious practices must be essential and integral to the religion to receive protection. With respect to Islam, the courts have held that having more than one wife is not an essential part of the religion. Legislation limiting the number of wives does not interfere with the right to practice religion and is within the scope of 'social welfare and reform," it had stated.

Polygyny:

It is the matrimonial structure in which a male individual has numerous wives.

Polygamy in this form is more common or widespread. Monarchs and emperors in the Indus Valley Civilisation were believed to have several wives.



Prevalence in India:

- The National Family Health Survey-5 (2019-20) showed the prevalence of polygamy was 2.1% among Christians, 1.9% among Muslims, 1.3% among Hindus, and 1.6% among other religious groups.
- The data showed that the highest prevalence of polygynous marriages was in the Northeastern states with tribal populations.
- A list of 40 districts with the highest polygyny rates was dominated by those with high tribal populations.

Tata arm to be first Indian company to make iPhones

Tata Electronics to buy Wistron's unit for \$125 million

BENGALURU, OCTOBER 27

IT'S FINAL, Taiwan-based Apple contract manufacturer Wistron Corp on Friday approved the sale of its plant in Karnataka to Tata group. This paves the way for the salt-to-software conglomerate to become the first domestic entity to manufacture iPhones.

"The transaction price is tentatively estimated at \$125 million," Wistron said in a statement. The company's board met on Friday to grant approval to subsidiaries, SMS InfoComm (Singapore) and Wistron Hong Kong, to sign an agreement with Tata Electronics for the sale of its 100 per cent indirect stake in Wistron InfoComm Manufacturing (India).

The deal will need to get regulatory approval after the agreement is signed. Talks between the Wistron and Tata Group were underway for more than a year. They have not yet sought regulatory approval for the deal.

"PM @narendramodi Ji's visionary PLI scheme has already propelled India into becoming a trusted & major hub for smartphone manufacturing and exports. Now within just two and a half years, @TataCompanies will now start making iPhones from India for domestic and global markets from India," minister of state for electronics and IT Rajeev Chandrasekhar, said on X.

The telecom ministry fully supports the growth of global Indian electronics companies that will, in turn, support global electronic brands that want to make India their trusted manufacturing and talent partner, he said.

Wistron also said its subsidiary, SMS InfoComm (Singapore), has proposed to convert debt of \$130.26 million to Wistron InfoComm Manufacturing into equity, as a part of the deal.

Wistron, which is one of Apple's three contract manufacturers in India, currently employs more than 10,000 workers at its facility. The company has also been selected for the smartphone production-linked incentive (PLI) scheme. With the sale of the plant, the PLI benefits will also get transferred to Tata group.

Wistron is selling its unit due to difficulties in handling supplies and inventory management. Further, the company is struggling to manage its workers, who went on strikes over pay parity issues.

Globally, Wistron will continue as a contract manufacturer for iPhones, and will continue to handle repair services in India.

The Wistron factory currently assembles the iPhone 14. Its commitment to ship at least \$1.8 billion worth of iPhones from the factory in the current financial year will now be taken over by Tata group.

Lately, Apple has been looking to move its manufacturing ecosystem out of China and the manufacturing partnership with Tata group will help it in this process. It will also lead to a larger relocation of Apple's manufacturing base to India. According to industry estimates, Wistron exported nearly \$500 million in iPhones from India in the April to June period.

According to industry estimates, Apple's sales from India rose nearly 45% to \$6 billion in FY23, hitting a record high. The company's exports from India are estimated to have crossed over \$5 billion.

Tata group has also been among the major beneficiaries in the Scheme for Promotion of Manufacturing of Electronic Components and Semiconductors. FE

Jio demonstrates nation's 1st satellite-based giga fiber service

With JioSpaceFiber, we expand our reach to cover the millions yet to be connected," Akash Ambani, chairman, Reliance Jio said at the inaugural session of the three-day Indian Mobile

Congress in New Delhi.

Meanwhile, Sunil Bharti Mittal, chairman of Bharti Enterprises, that its OneWeb Satellite communication is ready to serve the demand.

"Anybody, anywhere in the country can be connected from next month onwards from our satellite ground station that is being set up in Gujarat," Mittal said.

Both Airtel and Jio reaffirmed their commitment to soon cover the whole country with 5G services. However, they were silent on how they plan to monetise the services, where tariffs are same as that of 4G services.

he Union government on Saturday defended its decision to abstain in a UN General Assembly vote on a resolution that called for a humanitarian truce and ceasefire in Gaza, saying it did not include "explicit condemnation" of the October 7 terror attacks in Israel. A note circulated by government sources, responding to criticism from Opposition members about the vote, said that since India's concerns over omissions had not been covered by the final text of the resolution, it had decided to abstain.

"There can be no equivocation on terror," a source said, calling India's position "steadfast and consistent".

The resolution, titled the "Protection of civilians and upholding legal and humanitarian obligations", proposed by Jordan on behalf of the Arab League and co-sponsored by nearly 40 countries, was passed on Friday with 120 votes in favour, 14 including the U.S. and the U.K. against, and 45 abstentions, including India.

In its explanation of vote (EoV), France also objected to the omission of references to the October 7 attacks as well as the hostages taken, but in a break from its western allies, voted for the resolution saying "nothing can justify the suffering of civilians. All victims deserve our compassion, all lives are equal and there is no hierarchy between them".

The resolution adopted had condemned "all acts of violence aimed at Palestinian and Israeli civilians, including all acts of terrorism and indiscriminate attacks, as well as all acts of provocation, incitement and destruction". However, it did not specifically refer to the terror attacks by Hamas earlier this month that left more than 1,400 Israelis dead and 229 taken hostage.

In three weeks of retaliatory strikes by Israeli Defence Forces, the Health Ministry in Hamas-controlled Gaza has estimated that at least 7,700 Palestinians have been killed, around half of which are children.

In the EoV delivered by India's Deputy Permanent Representative Yojana Patel, India had called for condemnation of the attacks and for the immediate and unconditional release of hostages.

"Terrorism is a malignancy and knows no borders, nationality, or race. The world should not buy into any justification of terror acts," Ms. Patel said, before addressing the death toll from the IDF bombardment of Gaza.



Benefits of walking

How many steps a day can help reduce the risk of premature death?

The idea that you should take 10,000 steps a day originated in Japan in the 1960s, but had no scientific basis.
Researchers have now shown that, if we focus on the risk of dying from cardiovascular disease, most of the benefits are seen at around 7,000 steps.

An international study led by the University of Granada has provided the first scientific proof that 8,000 steps are needed to take per day to reduce the risk of premature death. Given the average length of a human stride, taking 8,000 steps is equivalent to walking approximately 6.4 kilometres a day. Researchers have also shown that the pace at which we walk has additional benefits, and that it is better to walk fast than slow. With regard to the risk of dying from cardiovascular disease, most of the benefits are seen at around 7,000 steps.

The study has for the first time shown that the more steps one takes, the better, and that there is no excessive number of steps that has been proven to be harmful to health.







The police were examining the video's time stamp, investigators also inspected Mr. Martin's rented house in Kochi and interviewed his wife. One aspect of the police probe has pivoted to the inner workings of the religious group, an official

said.

The police said that a lethal combination of low-grade gunpowder and petrol had caused the blast. Officials said that the saboteur had triggered six device's fragmentation in a confined and crowded space, it had an outsize impact.

According to investigators, Mr. Martin said that he had downloaded a bomb-making manual from

the internet and carried out trials, including dry runs, before the actual explosion. They were probing whether he operated as a lone wolf or had associates.

Muraleedharan said it was "disturbing to note" that Kerala was "becoming a place where such incidents are happening which are considered terrorist acts". Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, MP for Kerala's Wayanad, condemned the attack. "The bomb blasts during a prayer meeting in Ernakulam, Kerala, are deeply distressing and condemsed. lam, Kerala, are deeply distressing and condem-nable. My condolences to the bereaved family and I hope for a quick recovery for those injured There is no place for hatred and violence in a civilised society," he said in a post on X

"Those who foster violence must be dealt with an iron hand," said Congress president Mallikar-jun Kharge, posting on X.

IIT Kanpur to probe illegal sand mining

'Penny drop' verification is mandatory for NPS fund exit

The Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority has made 'penny drop' verification mandatory for the withdrawal of funds by subscribers of the National Pension System. Through the process, Central Recordkeeping Agencies (CRAs) check the active status of the savings bank account and match the name in the bank account number with the name in Permanent Retirement Account Number. The provisions will apply across NPS, Atal Pension Yoiana and NPS Lite for exits/withdrawals and for Yojana and NPS Lite for exits/withdrawals and to modification in subseribers' bank account details. The validity of the account is verified by making a 'test transaction' by dropping a small amount into the beneficiary's bank account and matching the name based on the response. m

Developed countries to overshoot carbon emissions goal, says study

Developed countries – responsible for three-fourths of existing carbon emissions – will end up emitting 38% more carbon in 2030 than they have committed to, going by current trajectories, shows a study published last week by the Delhi-based think tank Council for Energy Environment and Water (CEEW).

The study, which comes ahead of the 28th Conference of Parties (COP-28) of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change to be held in Dubai in November and December, shows that 83% of this overshoot will be caused by the U.S., Russia, and the European Union.

At COP-28, countries are expected to give an account of their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), which are their

commitments to the UN on emission cuts.

The CEEW study noted that the NDCs of developed countries already fall short of the global average reduction of emissions to 43% below 2019 levels that is needed to keep temperatures from rising above 1.5 degrees Celsius. Instead, developed countries' collective NDCs only amount to a 36% cut.

For a fighting chance at keeping warming below critical tipping points, decades of negotiations have obliged developed countries to lead global efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions with legally binding targets.



Collectively, developed countries were to reduce emissions by 5% from their 1990 levels between 2008 and 2012, and by 18% dur-

ing 2013 to 2020. Several countries have committed to achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2050. Doing so would require steady measurable cuts every decade until that year. As an intermediate objective, countries presented data to the UN on their proiected cuts until 2030. To keep temperatures below 1.5 degrees Celsius, developed countries need to cut emissions to 43% below their 2019 level. However, the CEEW study found that based on their current emissions trajectories, their cuts would likely amount to only 11% by 2030.

Except for two countries – Belarus and Norway – none of the developed countries seem to be on the path to meet their 2030 targets, though Japan and Kazakhastan are close, and are expected to miss their targets by only a single percentage point.
